But just 5 miles outside of Las Vegas stands Montezuma Castle. Built as a destination hotel by the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad in 1886, this 90,000-square-foot Queen Anne structure was considered one of the places to visit at the turn of the century. As a luxury hotel, the castle capitalized on the area's natural hot springs, and was a gateway to the excellent trout fishing in nearby Gallinas Creek.

The Montezuma Castle is a 90,000-square-foot (8,400 m²), 400 room Queen Anne style hotel building erected just northwest of the city of Las Vegas, New Mexico in 1886 (the site was at the time called "Las Vegas Hot Springs," but is now known as "Montezuma"). The current castle is actually the third on the site, the first two (dating to 1881 and 1885) were the first buildings in New Mexico to ...

Montezuma Castle was added to the National Register of Historic Places on October 15, 1966. It is an easy monument to visit, just a short distance off Interstate 17, at exit 289. There is a 1/3 mile (0.54 km) paved trail starting at the visitor center that follows the base of the cliff containing the ruins.

The passage of the Antiquities Act and the establishment of Montezuma Castle National Monument on 8 December 1906 extended to the site official designation as a point of national interest and nominally promised a greater degree of protection. However, these measures resulted in few practical changes in the day-to-day management of the ruins.

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
